**Course Description:** The study and practice of the fundamentals of conducting, including body awareness, baton and hand technique, beat patterns, basic styles, and expression. Pre-requisite: MUSC 2001.

# **Course Objectives:**

- 1. Development of basic conducting technique with an emphasis on simple metrical patterns and fundamental baton technique.
- 2. Knowledge of appropriate terminology, tempi, and transpositions
- 3. Development of interpretative skills as a musician
- 4. Basic score study
- 5. Establishment of a gesture vocabulary
- 6. Cultivation of self-awareness through non-verbal communication
